Identification number used by the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Postsecondary Education (OPE) to identify schools that have Program Participation Agreement (PPA) so that its students are able to participate in Federal Student Financial Assistance Programs under Title IV regulations. This is a 6-digit number followed by a 2-digit suffix used to identify branches, additional locations, and other identities that are part of the eligible institution.

CIP:

The Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP) is a taxonomic coding scheme for postsecondary instructional programs/fields of study that facilitates the organization, collection, and reporting of program data. The CIP was developed by the U.S. department of Education's National Center for Educational Statistics (NCES) and is the accepted federal government statistical standard on instructional program classifications and is used in a variety of educational information surveys and databases.

Contact Hour:

A unit of measure that represents an hour of instruction given to students.

Tuition and Retired for the Program:

The amount of tuition and required fees charged to a student for the entire program. Required fees are the fixed sums charged to students for items not covered by tuition and required of such a large proportion of all students that the student who does not pay the charge is an exemption. Institutions that do not charge by program, for example a 2-year program whose tuition rates change from one year to the next, would be required to calculate the total tuition and fees for the entire length of the program.

Normal Time:

The amount of time necessary for a student to complete all requirements for a degree or certificate according to the institution's catalog. This is typically 4 years (8 semesters or trimesters, or 12 quarters, excluding summer terms) for a bachelor's degree in a standard term-based institute; and the various scheduled times for certificate programs.

Books and Supplies for Entire Program:

The average cost of books and supplies for a typical student for the entire program, use your intuitional estimate.

Annual Room and Board Charges:

The annual room and board charges assessed students for an academic year rooming accommodations (for a typical student sharing a room other student) and meals.

Program Completion:

When a student completes all program requirements and receives a degree, diploma, certificate, or other formal award. In order to be considered a completion, the degree/award must actually be conferred.

Federal Student Loans:

Private Loans:

A loan provided by a private educational lender that is not a Title IV loan and that is used expressly for postsecondary educational expenses to a borrower, regardless of whether the loan is provided through the educational institution that the student attends or directly to the borrower from the private educational lender.

Institutional Financing Plans:

An institutional financing plan that is extension of credit to a student for educational cost that will be paid by the student (or on the students behalf) after the program of study has ended. The amount and frequency of the installment payments and whether they include a fee or interest are specified in the written plan.
